

## Form 5

Out of a total of 145 students who sat for the Hong Kong Certificate of Education Examination, 69 continued their studies in Form Lower 6 in this school and 31 in other schools. One repeated Form 5 in this school and 14 repeated Form 5 in other schools. 3 enrolled at the Hong Kong Polytechnic, 9 at the post secondary colleges and 2 enrolled in the Technical Institutes. One joined the police service and 6 went to Canada for further studies. 5 began to work.

The above figures show that the majority of our students were enthusiastic in pursuing further academic studies, either locally or abroad. Only a small percentage entered employment.

## EXTRA-CURRICULAR ACTIVITIES AND SOCIETIES

King's College places great emphasis on extra-curricular activities as an essential in the character-moulding of an all-rounded individual. The school plays a guiding and encouraging role through the provision of wide-ranging opportunities for students to develop their hobbies and interests outside the classroom. Each individual student is afforded ample opportunity to explore and develop his intellectual and physical potentials, to display initiative and co-operational ability as the organization of clubs and societies are in the hands of pupils themselves under the supervision of teacher-advisors.

There were altogether 29 clubs and societies, namely: Art Club, Bridge Club, Canoe Club, Catholic Society, Chess Club, Christian Fellowship, Chinese Literature Society, Civics Society, The Duke of Edinburgh's Award Scheme, Drama Society, English Literature and Debating Society, Folk-Dance Club, Gardening Club, Geography Society, Handicraft and Woodwork Club, History Society, Junior Red Cross, Music Association, Pen-Pal Club, Photographic Club, Rambling Club, The 5th Hong Kong Scout Group, Science Society, Stamp Club, Life-Saving Club, St. John Ambulance Society, Sports Club, Table-tennis Club, Buddhist Association.

The school had 34 classes consisting of 6 streams for Form 2 and 3, 5 streams for Form 1 and 4 and 4 streams for the rest of the Forms. Students are offered a broad general education before they specialize in arts or science in Form Lower 6. Accordingly, Form 5 students were given reasonable freedom to choose their subjects and most of them took at least eight subjects in the Hong Kong Certificate of Education Examination.

Class division in Form 6 remained the same. The four streams in Form 6 included one Arts, one Mathematics and two Biology.

Cultural education and physical training are of prime importance to a well-balanced education. Thus from Form 1 to Form 6, physical education was offered twice in a cycle while music was taught up to Form 3 and Art was taught up to Form 4. Though the two cultural subjects were not included in the curricula of Form 5 and 6, senior students were encouraged to take an active role in many activities organized by the Music Association and the Art Club in which they could explore the musical talents or refine their artistic skills. Their distinguished achievements in the Art Competition and School Music Festival were highly commendable.

The Prefects were selected from Forms 4, 5 and 6, working in consultation with the Principal, Discipline Master and Senior members of the staff. They helped in maintaining the discipline of the school, and caring for and guiding their fellow students. When the regular prefects were released from duties to prepare for examinations, their places were taken up by other students selected from Form 4 and Form Lower 6.

**THE LITERARY SIDE**

'The Fig Tree 80' the school magazine, was published in spite of technical difficulties. The main theme was on the growth and development of the school as reflected in school life. It presented a concise but realistic picture of the main events of the year and recorded a wide variety of activities organized by the clubs and societies in the school.

One issue of 'The Bridge', the school newspaper, was published during the academic year. The newspaper fulfilled its role by giving a profile of the highlights of the school functions and featuring interesting articles from students.

To promote students' interest in extensive reading and independent research, the library is well stocked with varied reading materials. Every effort has been made to improve the library, making it an ideal place for cultural pursuits and self-education. Old books were disposed of and new books recommended by the teaching staff were added. The total number of books in English were 23,600 and Chinese books numbered 6,830 making a total of 26,430.

Mention should be made of the one issue of bulletin published by the Science Society. Besides providing a general idea of the activities sponsored by the society, the bulletin gave ample opportunities for students to contribute their thoughts and record their findings and discoveries in their respective areas of interests.

**THE RELIGIOUS SIDE**

The school does not give any formal religious instruction but there are three societies organizing religious activities for and giving spiritual guidance to the pupils. The Christian Fellowship and the Catholic Society held regular meetings and morning prayers. Other activities included Bible studies, hymn-singing, talks, discussions, film and slide shows. The Buddhist Association also organized activities such as talks and discussion camps.

**CAREERS GUIDANCE AND EMPLOYMENT OPPORTUNITIES**

Vocational guidance was given due attention. Working alongside the Careers Section of the Education Department, valuable information on studies abroad and local employment opportunities was posted up on the careers' notice-board. Students were counselled to orientate themselves in society when they leave school. The careers talks and visits to careers exhibitions arranged were geared to this end. Above all the much sought for individual counselling was offered by the careers master.

**GUIDANCE AND COUNSELLING SERVICE**

Our school has joined the School Social Work Scheme jointly organized by the Education and Social Welfare Department for two years already. A school social worker, Miss Mok, came to the school every Monday afternoon to assist students with problems which might hinder their development academically, socially, emotionally and otherwise.

Our Science Society participated in the 13th Joint School Science Exhibition held in July, 1980, and won the First Prize in the Individual Projects Section.

In art our pupils have continued to excel. In the Hong Kong Students' Painting Competition sponsored by the Education Department, 'Wah Kiu Yat Po' and the Hong Kong Non-graduate Teacher Union, King's College won Second Prize in the Junior Section.

We were also awarded a gold medal, in addition to eight individual prizes, for the contributions in art made by our pupils in the social care contest, 'A Gift of Yourself', sponsored by the Rotaract Club of Victoria.

Regarding another cultural interest of the school, our pupils gained high honours in the Hong Kong Schools' Music and Speech Festival. In the Harmonica Section our band won the second place, while the ensemble group took third position. Besides, there were individual awards, consisting of one first prize, three second prizes and two third prizes.

In the Chinese Instrument Section our orchestra gained second place in the Advanced Class. Moreover our pupils won two first prizes and four third prizes in the individual items.

In the Speech Competitions two pupils were awarded a second and a third prize respectively.

Our achievements in Sports merit a special mention. In the Inter-School Volleyball Competition (Division 1), our A and B grade school teams won the championship in their respective grades, while our C-Grade team came third.

We have also had commendable results in several competitions in Division 2. In the Inter-School Swimming Competition our school A-grade team was the champion and our B-grade team came third. In the over-all results we won three gold medals, three silver medals and six bronze medals.

Our school team was also the champion in the Inter-School Life-Saving Competition and was awarded the South China Morning Post Shield.

Furthermore we won two gold medals, three silver medals and one bronze medal in the Inter-School Athletics Competition.

All the achievements I have mentioned reflect the sustained endeavour and cooperation of staff and pupils. In paying my tribute of thanks to the teaching staff I want to include the supporting staff and office clerks who have helped in the management and smooth running of the school. My gratitude is also due to those masters who gave up much of their summer vacation in carrying out essential tasks and in preparing for the new academic year.

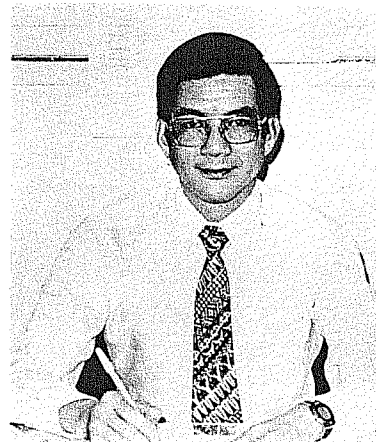

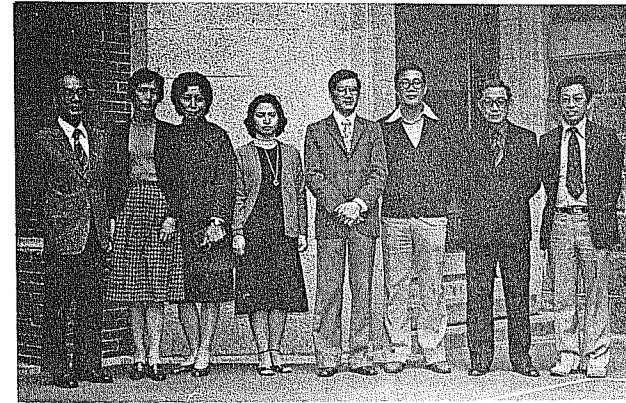
